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	<div>4th September 1666</div> <div>Buildings blown up to save the Tower of London</div> <div>5th September 1666</div> <div>St Paul's catches fire</div> <div>Fire ends</div>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • It ended on Wednesday 5th September 1666. • Buildings burnt quickly because they were made of wood and thatch and it had been a hot, dry summer. • The houses were close together so the fire spread quickly. • People tried to stop the fire spreading by creating firebreaks or using fire-fighting equipment. • Many people were made homeless and much of London was destroyed. • We know about the fire from artefacts such as bricks, paintings, songs and diary entries from people who witnessed the fire. • After the fire, buildings had to be made of brick and roads were made wider to stop fires from getting out of control.
